Funding

\$25.6 million has been provided to support industry's transition to an eID system with \$21.6 million coming from the State's Royalties for Regions program and \$4 million coming from the Federal Government.

The Tag Incentive Payment (TIP) scheme currently provides a \$0.75 discount per fully accredited NLIS eID at the point-of-sale, for the current year-of-birth colour. Visit the department's website to see which eID tags are eligible for this discount.

\$3.52 million was made available toward an Infrastructure Grants scheme to assist downstream operators purchase and install essential eID equipment, including scanners, readers, wands and other limited infrastructure needs.

Support for electronic identification of sheep and goats



eID Rationale

Rapid identification is key to an effective and efficient response to emergency animal diseases, residue or food safety incidents.

The Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development continues to collaborate with industry, producers and numerous peak bodies toward achieving a seamless transition to an eID system that will improve the State's response times to such incidents.

Electronic identification devices

Electronic identification devices (eIDs) contain a radio frequency identifier (RFID) able to be read via a hand-held scanning wand or panel reader. Fully accredited National Livestock Identification System (NLIS) sheep and goat eIDs (ear tags for sheep and goats and hock bands for some goats) will replace the existing visual tagging system.

Each accredited eID has a unique internal serial number, which is assigned to your NLIS account's Property Identification Code (PIC) when manufactured. When your sheep or goats are moved off your PIC, the unique serial number is scanned and uploaded to the NLIS database where a movement record is captured along with the new location of the livestock. The eIDs are also printed with a unique set of letters and numbers, which can also be used for visual identification.
