Wheatbelt	Peel-Harvey Catchment Council Inc.	Defending Dryandra - Phase 2	The Defending Dryandra Phase 2 project will continue the important work of phase 1 and implement targeted feral cat management on three properties surrounding Dryandra Woodland National Park to reduce the threat of predation to threatened species including numbats. Activities include fauna monitoring using 4G cameras and targeted feral cat control through trapping and ground shooting by pest animal control contractor. Public awareness of feral cats will increase through a workshop in Dryandra and communication materials.	\$218,110
Pilbara	Pintupi Waarrkarrinyi Tjungu Ltd	Protecting Kiwirrkurra threatened species through targeted cat control	Following a successful two-year trial of aerial baiting at a high priority bilby population on Kiwirrkurra country in the remote Gibson Desert, Kiwirrkurra people are keen to expand their feral cat control efforts. This project aims to trial a second tool (Felixer deployment) for highly targeted control of cats at a high-priority great desert skink population.	\$39,108
Kimberley	Mt Pierre Pastoral Aboriginal Corporation	Mt Pierre Pastoral Station Feral Cat Management Program	This project will run a community-led feral cat control program on Mount Pierre pastoral station in the central Kimberley, Western Australia. Over an initial 20,000-hectare area, we and our project partner Yougawalla Cattle Company will use humane cage trapping and remote cameras in rotating control blocks around four key sites: Old Bohemia, Riwi Cave, Jupi Cave and Paddy Springs. Reducing feral cat pressure on quolls, wallabies, frogs and other native animals around those sites, the project helps keep that Country healthier for future generations. The project will protect native animals and cultural sites while building a strong data set to support our future inclusion in government feral cat programs and creating real jobs and skills for Mount Pierre people on Country.	\$179,540
South West	Lower Blackwood Land Conservation District Committee	Feral Cat Control on the Scott Coastal Plain	This project will build on the past two years of effort to strengthen collaborative feral cat management across the Scott Coastal Plain (SCP). In partnership with the Lower Blackwood Vertebrate Pest Management Group (LBVPMG), rural landholders, plantation companies, DBCA, DPIRD and local government, it will deliver coordinated, priority control actions to reduce the impact of feral cats and protect key environmental assets. The project will engage Traditional Owners and the local community, supporting awareness, capacity building and on-ground participation to maximise long-term outcomes and stewardship.	\$63,242
